MEP Mureșan Challenges PSD to Form Government with AUR

MEP Siegfried Mureșan has publicly invited the PSD party to assume governance responsibilities immediately. He specifically noted that they already possess a potential majority with the AUR party. This statement criticizes PSD President Sorin Grindeanu for blaming PNL for the government collapse. Mureșan argues that PSD should accept responsibility for their own political alliances. He questions why PSD waits for PNL to resolve the crisis instead of acting. The situation highlights significant political instability within Romania. There is a notable lack of accountability among the ruling parties. Liberal parties are willing to challenge the PSD narrative publicly. Grindeanu is attempting to justify his party's recent actions. The Romanian political landscape remains complex and fragmented. Different parties maintain

conflicting narratives and interests. This standoff could delay the formation of a stable new government. Public trust in political institutions may suffer further. Only 5% of Population Covered by Civil Shelters in War Scenario

Romania Summons Russian Ambassador Following Leipzig Drone Attack

Romania's Ministry of Foreign Affairs has summoned the Russian Ambassador. Vladimir Lipaev was called in solidarity with Germany following a drone attack. The incident occurred at the Leipzig/Halle airport involving explosives. German police identified two men with Russian passports as suspects. The drone collided with a DHL cargo plane causing minor damage. Another drone with military explosive was found ten days later. Germany has officially accused Russia of being behind the attempt. Foreign Minister Oana Țoiu expressed solidarity with affected European countries. She condemned Russia's hybrid activities and interference. Lipaev was previously summoned after attacks on EU and NATO officials. The government promises a coordinated response with EU partners. Accountability for Russia's actions is a primary demand. This incident is part of a broader pattern of aggression. Ongoing tensions between Russia and the West are escalating. Eastern Europe security architecture is being tested. Diplomatic channels are being used to convey strong messages. The airport serves as a critical military and logistics hub. Investigation continues into the act of terrorism. Government Officials Seek EU Clarification on PNRR Funds

Foreign Minister Oana Tîoiu and interim Premier Ilie Bolojan contacted the EU Justice Commissioner. They requested verification regarding the Fritz amendment in the ANI Law. The analysis concerns the allocation of 770 million euros from PNRR. This funding is tied to the fulfillment of a specific justice milestone. Leaders of PPE and Renew Europe groups signed a letter to the Commission. They warned that funds would not be released if rule of law is violated. The European Commission has requested clarifications from the Government. This is part of the evaluation for payment request number 6. The Law regarding integrity is central to this assessment. Monitoring Group meetings will include interviews with Romanian representatives. Renew Europe has proposed a resolution against Romania. Several aspects are considered worrying from a rule of law perspective. Legislative compliance with European standards is under scrutiny. Financial implications are significant for the national budget. Political negotiations are intensifying in Brussels. The Government must respond to these formal inquiries soon. Transparency in the judicial reform process is needed. Judicial independence remains a key condition for funding. Failure to comply could result in withheld funds. Stakeholders are watching the outcome closely.

Dutch Central Bank Relocates Gold Reserves to London

The Dutch central bank, DNB, has partially moved its gold reserves. Reserves were transferred from the US and Canada to London. The move involved both buying and selling operations totaling 86 tonnes. Holdings in New York and Ottawa were reduced significantly. London holdings increased from 18.1% to 32.1% of the total. The bank claims this allows quicker mobilization in times of crisis. DNB President Olaf Sleijpen stated the aim is improved resilience. The total reserve represents a value of 72.2 billion euros. This shift is a response to growing geopolitical tensions. Diversification of gold holdings is a key strategic goal. ETFs and open-end funds are also evolving in the landscape. Investors are advised to consider liquidity and costs carefully. Trading commissions vary between the different fund types. Open-end funds offer small investment options without commission. However, they carry risks regarding price knowledge at purchase. Global financial markets may feel the impact of this shift. The value of gold remains a stable asset in uncertainty. Central banks are increasingly reevaluating storage locations. Security of assets is prioritized over traditional locations. This trend may influence other national banks to follow suit.

Massive ID Verification Breach Exposes 150 Million Records

A suspected massive data breach involving identity verification company IDScan has exposed over 150 million driver's licenses and passports. The leaked data belongs to US and Canadian citizens, marking it as the largest known single

breach of identity documents in recent times. Security journalist Brian Krebs discovered the leak after finding his own driver's license among the searchable records on a dark web site. Hackers allegedly gained near real-time access to IDScan's systems, allowing them to add new documents to the database daily. The breach impacts thousands of individuals, including high-profile figures such as Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth. IDScan.net, a New Orleans-based firm, verifies government-issued identity documents for various organizations including car rental companies. The FBI's New Orleans field office is currently probing the matter alongside the company's internal investigation. This incident highlights the significant risks associated with storing vast amounts of sensitive identity data for extended periods. Concerns are exacerbated as governments roll out age-verification laws that rely on requiring adults to upload their identity documents. The breach has been largely attributed to the growth of dark web marketplaces and the increasing sophistication of cybercrime operations. IDScan representatives did not immediately respond to questions regarding the lack of transparency surrounding the incident. Fortunately, the scanning service went dark after the report was made, though it remains unclear if individuals can check if their IDs are included.

Uber Cuts 10% of Workforce in Major Restructuring

Uber is laying off approximately 3,300 employees, representing 10% of its global workforce, as part of a significant restructuring effort. CEO Dara Khosrowshahi announced the changes in an internal email, citing the need to cut management layers and invest more in core divisions. The company aims to reduce the number of managers by 20% and eliminate remote jobs, allowing only 1% of staff to work from home. The layoffs will involve reducing teams with one or two members by 50% to simplify the organizational structure. Uber is also combining its engineering, science, and delivery divisions to increase efficiency and focus on key business areas. This restructuring is aimed at reducing costs and redirecting investment towards ridesharing, delivery, and robotaxi services. The changes affect about half of the company's teams, with remote jobs being phased out to reduce operational expenses. Key people involved in the announcement include Khosrowshahi and the affected employees across various global departments. The move demonstrates Uber's efforts to adapt to the changing ride-hailing landscape and improve its financial bottom line. The restructuring is expected to have a significant impact on the company's workforce and future operational direction. Growth has led to increased complexity within the company, and this restructuring is aimed at addressing these organizational issues. The company's global workforce will be reduced, and the layoffs will likely have a ripple effect on various stakeholders and market perceptions.

Trump Administration Accused of Concealing AI Safety Testing Rules

The Trump administration may be forced to reveal secret rules federal agencies use for AI safety testing following transparency demands. A secret framework allegedly favoring rapid deployments of AI models by favored firms has been proposed, potentially hiding corruption. The framework involves agencies such as the Office of the National Cyber Director, the Treasury Department, and the Commerce Department. Key people involved include President Trump, US Representative Greg Casar, and California state Senator Josh Becker. The framework matters because it could compromise national security and public safety given the increasing threat of AI cybersecurity risks. Protect Democracy and other organizations are calling for transparency and accountability from the agencies involved in the process. Critics

argue the public cannot trust Trump to act in good faith when choosing which AI models to rigorously test. The lack of transparency raises significant concerns about the effectiveness of the review process and potential industry favoritism. California is considering a bill that would establish transparent AI safety standards, marking a departure from the federal approach. The bill, SB 813, has already undergone public input and revision to ensure robust safety benchmarks. If passed, it would make the latest benchmarks and methodologies used to evaluate AI risks transparent to the public. This developing situation highlights the tension between federal deregulation and state-level efforts to ensure AI safety.

New York City Public Schools Ban Generative AI Through Middle School

The New York City Public Schools is banning the use of generative AI for students from pre-K through eighth grade for the 2026-27 school year. The decision affects over half a million students in the nation's largest school district. Mayor Zohran Mamdani announced the moratorium, stating that the tech industry's push for AI-powered early education is not necessary. The city will spend the next year studying the impacts of generative AI on education before making further decisions. The ban includes software that uses student-facing AI and companion chatbots within the classroom environment. However, high school students will be exempt from the ban, with the district offering AI literacy classes to help them think critically. The city's AI moratorium is the most expansive in the nation, aiming to mitigate concerns about potential negative effects on learning. This move matters because it signals a cautious approach to the integration of AI in education systems. It sets a precedent for other cities and districts to follow regarding technology adoption in schools. The ban also highlights the need for critical thinking and media literacy in the digital age. Educators will need to adapt their curricula to comply with the new restrictions while maintaining educational standards. Parents and advocacy groups have expressed mixed reactions to the sweeping prohibition on AI tools.

OpenAI's New Reasoning Technique Sparks Safety Concerns

OpenAI's new Astra model will use a reasoning technique called recurrent depth or opaque recurrence. This technique allows the model to process the same query multiple times in a loop internally. The process potentially makes the model's chain of thought more difficult to monitor by external safety experts. This development has raised concerns among AI safety experts who fear it could lead to a race to the bottom in monitorability. Key individuals involved include Buck Shlegeris, CEO of Redwood, and Zvi Mowshowitz, a long-time AI safety advocate. Redwood Research chief scientist Ryan Greenblatt also expressed concerns about the potential risks of opaque reasoning. The technique is reportedly limited to Astra's use and not planned for widespread adoption immediately. However, experts worry about its potential impact on AI safety standards as it grows in use across different models. OpenAI has pushed back against suggestions that it plans to use neuralese to hide its reasoning processes. The company has committed to legible chains of thought monitoring systems despite the new technique. Despite this assurance, concerns persist about the potential risks of opaque reasoning in advanced AI systems. The emergence of this technique has significant implications for the development of safe and reliable AI systems globally.

Buffett Successor Reveals Massive Alphabet AI Bet

Warren Buffett's successor, Greg Abel, has revealed that the legendary investor placed a significant bet on Alphabet to capitalize on the artificial intelligence boom. Berkshire Hathaway currently maintains a substantial stake in the tech giant, valued at nearly \$38 billion. This position now stands as the third-largest holding in Berkshire's extensive investment portfolio. Abel attributed Buffett's strategic move to Alphabet's pivotal role in the AI space and the firm's visibility into the technology's potential. Remarkably, Buffett built this stake from scratch in under a year, demonstrating a rare speed for the usually deliberate investor. The investment involved a \$10 billion commitment secured at a 6.5% discount through a private placement in late May. This move marks a notable departure from Buffett's traditional focus on predictable, attractively valued businesses outside the tech sector. Alphabet's founders, Larry Page and Sergey Brin, have previously acknowledged Buffett's influence on their own business philosophies. They cited his essays and owner's manual as inspirations for Google's 2004 IPO prospectus, creating a circular history of admiration. Abel emphasized the strong working relationship he shares with Buffett, noting frequent discussions on investment strategies. The partnership suggests a smooth transition of power as Berkshire navigates the evolving tech landscape. This investment underscores Berkshire's willingness to adapt its strategy under Buffett's leadership to capture growth in emerging sectors. Analysts view the stake as a validation of Alphabet's long-term viability amidst intense AI competition. The timing of the private placement allowed Berkshire to enter at a favorable valuation before wider market recognition. Such a large position indicates high conviction in the company's ability to monetize AI innovations. It also signals to the market that even value-oriented investors see immense potential in AI infrastructure. The disclosure comes as Berkshire continues to refine its portfolio for the post-Buffett era. Investors are closely watching how Abel will manage these tech-heavy positions moving forward. The success of this bet could define Berkshire's performance in the latter half of the decade. TPG-Backed Healthcare Firm Files for \$2.5 Billion IPO

Asia OneHealthcare Sdn., backed by global investment firm TPG Inc., has confidentially filed for an initial public offering in Kuala Lumpur. The IPO aims to raise up to 10 billion ringgit, which translates to approximately \$2.5 billion. This fundraising effort would make it the largest IPO in Malaysia since FGV Holdings Bhd.'s offering in 2012. The healthcare provider has submitted a draft registration to the Securities Commission Malaysia to initiate the process. TPG Inc. is leveraging its global investment expertise to support this significant market entry. Asia OneHealthcare Sdn. operates as a major healthcare provider within the region. Oil Prices Steady Near \$95 Amid Iran Tensions

US President Donald Trump has stated that renewed attacks on Iran would be short-lived. US officials have signaled robust energy flows through the Strait of Hormuz despite the conflict. ActBlue Official Pleads Fifth in Foreign Donation Probe

Kimberly Peeler-Allen, a member of ActBlue's board of directors, invoked the Fifth Amendment during congressional testimony. This follows similar moves by other ActBlue officials facing scrutiny. ActBlue is under investigation by the House Administration Committee for potential fraudulent and foreign political donations. The committee, led by Chairman Bryan Steil, is looking into ActBlue's fraud-prevention procedures. Particular attention is being paid to the lack of requirement for donors to provide credit card CVV security codes. ActBlue co-founder Matt DeBergalis and CEO Regina Wallace-Jones have also invoked the Fifth Amendment during their own testimony. The investigation began in 2023, following concerns that ActBlue's procedures were inadequate to prevent illegal foreign donations. The committee wants to ensure that ActBlue has sufficient protocols in place to prevent foreign funds from entering US elections. Republicans deny the investigation is politically motivated, citing the serious threat of foreign money in American elections. ActBlue has denied wrongdoing, but its attorneys had previously warned internally that the organization's procedures were not always followed. These internal warnings created a risk for ActBlue that is now being examined by lawmakers. The investigation is ongoing, with Steil stating that witnesses' refusal to answer questions has frustrated lawmakers. Lawmakers are seeking detailed information about ActBlue's operations and security measures. The refusal to testify limits the committee's ability to draw definitive conclusions quickly. Public trust in digital donation platforms is a key underlying concern for the committee. Security experts argue that CVV requirements are standard for preventing fraud. The absence of such checks raises questions about the integrity of the donation stream. Political opponents are using the investigation to highlight vulnerabilities in campaign finance systems. ActBlue maintains that its systems are compliant with current federal regulations. The outcome of this probe could lead to significant changes in how online political donations are processed.

Pennsylvania Data Center Offers Residents \$10,000 Payments

A proposed data center campus in Pennsylvania is offering \$10,000 payments to residents in Hazle Township to secure community support. NorthPoint Development's 1,300-acre project was rejected last November, prompting new strategies. The developer is now adopting creative strategies to win over local residents who previously opposed the plan. NorthPoint Development is making a \$165 million offer to establish a township police department. The package also includes lowering garbage-collection bills and funding community programs. Paying residents directly is part of a broader effort to address mounting local resistance to data centers. Data centers are facing cancellations or delays due to surging negative sentiment across the nation. The project is one of many data centers at risk, with nearly half of the nation's planned 16 gigawatts of capacity facing cancellation. The proposal is seen as a response to growing public concerns about the impact of data centers on communities. The offer is also notable for its direct financial investment in a Pennsylvania municipality. This represents an unprecedented level of investment in local community rebuilding. The project's success could set a new standard for data centers nationwide. Direct payments to residents and investments in rebuilding communities might become the gold standard. The proposal is part of a larger trend of developers seeking to address community concerns. Securing support for data center projects is becoming increasingly difficult without significant incentives. Local residents are weighing the financial benefits against potential environmental and infrastructure impacts. Township officials are reviewing the proposal to determine if it meets long-term community needs. This case highlights the shifting dynamics between tech infrastructure developers and local governments. Other developers may look to this model if NorthPoint succeeds in gaining approval. Ultimately, the decision rests on whether the community values the immediate financial injection over other concerns.

Mass Protests Erupt in Spain Over Ceuta Migrant Crisis

Thousands of migrants have crossed into the Spanish enclave of Ceuta on the north African coast, leading to significant unrest and protests in the city. Spanish opposition parties, including the conservative Partido Popular and the far-right Vox party, have accused Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez of abandoning the residents of Ceuta. The government denies these accusations, blaming trafficking gangs and online misinformation for the current crisis. Morocco has denied orchestrating or being involved in the mass crossing of individuals across the border. At least 72,000 migrants crossed into Ceuta in just two days, creating a logistical nightmare for local authorities. Approximately 5,000 individuals remain in makeshift camps or scattered across the city awaiting processing. Protests have been held daily, with demonstrators calling for the migrants to be sent back to their countries of origin. Other demonstrators are demanding that the migrants be redistributed across Spain to alleviate the pressure on Ceuta. The protests have been organized by city councils across Spain, where opposition parties govern or have significant popularity. The rallies have grown in size, with over 50,000 people gathering in Madrid recently. Crowds in the capital are calling on Sánchez to resign over his handling of the situation. This crisis matters because it highlights tensions between Spain and Morocco regarding border control. It raises serious questions about the government's handling of migration policies in the region. Major UK Employers Penalized for Minimum Wage Violations

The UK government has issued notices to over 600 employers for paying staff below the minimum wage. Major firms including B&Q and Five Guys are among those named in the latest enforcement action. The list includes various businesses such as shops, restaurants, nurseries, and even NHS trusts. A total of £4m in outstanding wages has been returned to workers following the investigation. B&Q underpaid 4,530 workers a total of £456,000 during the relevant period. Five Guys underpaid 3,699 staff members approximately £54,000. The government has issued penalties worth £7m to the affected businesses to deter future violations. The underpayments spanned multiple time periods, with some instances dating back to 2019. The minimum wage rates in the UK are currently £12.71 for staff aged 21 and over. Workers aged 18 to 20 are entitled to £10.85 per hour under current regulations. Under 18s and apprentices have a minimum rate set at £8 per hour. The government is cracking down on the practice of short-changing staff across all sectors. Business Secretary Jonathan Reynolds stated that paying less than minimum wage is not only illegal. He emphasized that fair pay is not just the right thing to do, but also the smart thing to do. The Fair Work Agency has also warned that it will tackle practices of denying workers holiday pay.

Four Charged With Murder After Baby Found Stabbed in Sheffield

Four Slovakian nationals have been charged with murdering a newborn baby girl found in Sheffield. The victim was found with 33 stab wounds at a house in the Holywell Heights area. Motional and MIT AI explains self-driving car decisions

Researchers at Motional and MIT have developed a system called Concept-Wrapper Network. This system is known as CW-Net for short. It allows self-driving cars to explain their decisions in real-time. This development addresses the notorious black-box problem in autonomous vehicle AI. The system was published in the prestigious journal Nature. It translates a self-driving system's internal calculations into concepts that humans can understand. CW-Net was tested on an autonomous vehicle with an experienced safety operator in the driver's seat. The testing showed its effectiveness in identifying and resolving issues during operation. The system is designed to provide causally faithful explanations to

users. This distinguishes it from approaches that simply generate natural-language explanations. The researchers tested CW-Net on a private test track initially. They also tested it on public roads around Las Vegas. They found it to be effective in identifying errors and improving safety. The system's deployment is seen as crucial for building trust in autonomous vehicles. Regulators are increasingly demanding more transparency about AI decision-making. The researchers believe that CW-Net has the potential to become a baseline requirement. It could become a requirement for autonomous vehicle operators specifically. It will also be essential for other safety-critical domains such as drones and robotic surgery. The development tackles the black-box problem which has hindered widespread adoption.

Trump Administration Sides With OpenAI in New York Times Copyright Lawsuit

The Trump Administration has sided with OpenAI in its legal battle. This battle is with the New York Times over the use of copyrighted materials. The materials were used in training artificial intelligence tools. The government filed a letter to the court arguing OpenAI's actions were within bounds. They argued that the Times' definition of fair use is inconsistent with current copyright law. The administration claims that training AI tools on copyrighted works is extraordinarily transformative. They state this process does not significantly compete with the original work. The letter warns that a win for the Times could have disastrous consequences. These consequences would affect the US AI industry and global leadership. The government's stance is seen as a significant development in the case. It has implications for the broader copyright law and the use of AI. The move has been criticized by the Author's Guild. The Guild filed its own lawsuit against OpenAI recently. They called the government's letter replete with faulty arguments and a gross misunderstanding of copyright law. The case has significant implications for the use of AI in the media industry. There are dozens of ongoing lawsuits over the legality of training AI tools. The US district judge overseeing the case is Sidney H. Stein. He is not obliged to let the government's letter influence his decision. He is likely to take it seriously due to its weight.

These Russian Mathematicians Taught AI Models How to Talk to Each Other Without Using Words

A Russian startup called Mostik has developed a new communication method. It allows artificial intelligence models to communicate via machine telepathy. They use mathematical values found in their weights to do this. This approach allows smaller models to be fed the capabilities of larger models. This increases their intelligence and efficiency significantly. Mostik's technique has been applied to a hybrid system recently. The system combined a Chinese open-weight model with a smaller one. The result costs one-twentieth of the full model. It performs exactly halfway between the two models. The approach was developed by Mostik's CEO Sasha Malysheva. It was also developed by chief scientist Stanislav Smirnov. It has the potential to revolutionize the field of AI. It enables the combination of multiple models to achieve better results. This could enable open-weight models to compete more effectively with proprietary models. Companies like Anthropic and OpenAI offer such proprietary models. The technique could lead to the development of more specialized models. Specific domains such as biology and physics could benefit. Key players involved include Mostik, Lovable, and Google DeepMind. Experts predict that this approach could be years ahead of current state-of-the-art.

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
